Mothering Sunday
Brian Reader comments on the front cover

The picture on our front cover reminds us that, this year, Mothering Sunday occurs on the 19th March.

Historically, it was considered important for people to return to their home or 'mother' church once a year. So,

each year in the middle of Lent, everyone would visit their 'mother' church the main church or cathedral of the area. Inevitably this became an occasion for family reunions when children who were working away returned home. (It was quite common in those days for children to leave home for work once they were ten years old.)

Historians think that it was the return to the 'Mother' church which led to the tradition of children, particularly those working as domestic servants or apprentices, being given the day off to visit their mother and family. As they walked along the country lanes, these youngsters would pick wildflowers or violets to take to church or give to their mother as a small gift.



The food associated with Mothering Sunday is the Simnel cake, a fruit cake with two layers of almond paste, one on top and one in the middle. The cake is made with 11 balls of marzipan icing on top representing the 11 disciples. (Judas is not included.) Traditionally, sugar violets would also be added.

But during the war I hated it because my mother had to use a substitute for



marzipan. There were no ground almonds, nor fresh eggs. She used water, dried egg, soya flour and almond essence. The resultant paste was a brilliant yellow. The combination of soya and almond essence gave off a strong bitter aroma, which might pass for the smell of marzipan provided it was breathed in through a gas mask!

we may feel like wringing our hands in despair. Christian Aid is one of the many organizations that have not given in to this temptation but who are instead responding with practical help.

Christian Aid has been responding to humanitarian disasters since 1945, aiming to be accountable to affected populations, and usually working with local partners. For instance, with the ACT Alliance (Action by Churches Together), it has delivered 28 tonnes of food to Ukrainian people displaced by the Russian invasion. It has also been helping those suffering in Turkey and Syria from the recent earthquake.

In the next few weeks I shall be making my own tiny contribution to the work of Christian Aid by taking part in the North Staffordshire Sponsored Walk round Tittesworth Reservoir, which takes place on Saturday 25th March. If you wish to sponsor me, there is a form to fill in at the back of the church.

Better still you could do the walk around the reservoir yourself. I shall leave a couple of spare sponsorship forms underneath my form. It is a beautiful walk, and you can get a well-earned cup of tea or even lunch in the visitors' centre.



Notes from 'The Counting House'

Finance report from our Treasurer Richard Raymond

The Treasurer's office has been rather too busy lately to catch the Editor's very reasonable deadlines, so the contributions under the title of 'The Numbers Crunch' have dried up! However, under a new title, here are some snippets about money matters.

Many of you will know that I am one of the two organisers of the Hospice Christmas Tree Collection, which took place in early January. Supported by so many people throughout our East Cheshire communities, this raised over £145,000 whilst recycling nearly 6700 trees. Thank you to our church congregation for their donation, and to those people in Bollington who booked in trees or helped us as volunteers.

To church matters, and we have passed through another financial year end. It runs with the calendar year, so all the figures up to 31st December have been compiled into the 2022 accounts. These were sent to an independent auditor who checked all the income and expenditure, and then ratified that the figures are indeed a true record of the church's financial position. All of this has been completed and the PCC will discuss the results at its next meeting in early March. The accounts will be formally presented at our Annual Parish Church Meeting in April.

I have noticed that one or two people have increased their regular giving and I am most grateful for this. We are doing all we can to keep our costs down and we have made some decisions on how we can do this. We are running a Lent Thanksgiving Appeal along the lines of the Harvest Thanksgiving Appeal. Red envelopes are at the back of church and any contributions to this will be most welcome.

In the meantime, a reminder that our bank account name is 'The Anglican Parish of Bollington PCC'. Our account number is 39536416 and the sort code is 01-05-41. If anyone wishes to talk to me in private about any sort of donation, I am happy to be contacted.

Winter visitors to our garden

We have a hebe growing right against our kitchen window; it is a little microcosm of wildlife. As it is so near the window, we can look closely at whatever alights on the

bush. In the late summer, the bush is covered with bees and hover flies, feeding on the nectar in the purple flowers. But this winter it has attracted new guests, in the form of long-tailed tits. I have long been a follower of these little birds as they often arrive in the summer in groups of up to half a dozen, flitting from tree to tree. I always feel they are a family group staying together after fledging. They are not as colourful at the blue tit, but they can hardly be missed by their paler bodies and very long tails, which allow them to balance upside down on the branches.

They have been almost daily visitors to the hebe during the last month (January/February) — usually singly but sometimes as a pair — feeding off the seeds that have been left from decay of the summer flowers. The birds regularly peck at the glass of the window; it was difficult to understand why. We can only think that they are seeing a reflection of the shrub in the window and pecking at that. They are indeed extremely agile, hanging upside down, and even clinging onto the window frame.

These birds are well known for their social nest building. They use moss, lichens, wool and spiders' webs felted together and lined with countless feathers. The nest is deep and domed, the entrance hole being at the side or the top. Scientists that have studied nest building concluded that the creation of the long-tailed tits' complicated nest is a co-operative effort from the members of the pair from start to finish. Their nests can hold up to ten chicks and are often vandalised by other birds. It is known that the family relatives join in to rebuild the nests – cousins, aunts and all.

It's difficult not to admire them.

The sermon I never gave - on playing golf!

Some of you know that I enjoy playing golf, but I wonder how many of you know that it can teach you a lot about life. For example, you can have good days and you can have bad days, and I am not just talking about the weather! But at least you are taking exercise in the fresh air and you could be away from the 'phone for three hours plus, or at least that is how it used to be before mobile 'phones!



Golf is a game of skill, with players matched against each other, using a handicap system which allows players of widely different standards to enjoy a game together. You are probably thinking that this does not seem much like life as you know it, and you would be right. Life has obstacles and disasters along the way and so it is with golf. The simple idea is to hit a small ball from the starting area which is called the TEE, over varying distances and into a HOLE specially cut on a beautifully cut GREEN. But before you get to the GREEN, there are a number of obstacles to avoid.

You are supposed to hit your ball down the FAIRWAY, but either side there is the ROUGH which can be long grass, bushes or trees and beyond that is the OUT OF BOUNDS. And then there are the WATER HAZARDS, streams, ponds or lakes to which the ball is attracted to have an early bath!

If that were not enough trouble, there are then the manmade BUNKERS, hollows in the ground or deep chasms filled with sand which welcome any errant ball.

To enable any progress to be made, there is a RULE BOOK which tells you what to do and the PENALTIES incurred, much like the Bible. When no one is close, it is easy to cheat on a golf course, but what satisfaction would that bring in the long run?

So as you stand on the TEE, pondering what to do, you have choices, just as you do in life. You could try and be safe and hit a gentle shot, or try a braver



shot to give you an advantage, perhaps over the pond or bunkers. But you know that taking risks has let you down in the past! Sometimes the slope of the fairway or the wind has put even the simplest of shot into trouble, while your opponent has had a lucky break and bounces over a stream. Even when you get to the green, a worm cast can

deflect your ball away from the hole, while your opponent's ball just topples in.

So where is God when you are playing golf? Well like life, God is always present; helping us to accept both disappointments and successes with equal grace. And if all goes badly on one round, then just enjoy the fresh air and the walk, and praise God for all beauties of nature you can see around you.

We continue our series on the spiritual disciplines that help us to grow and deepen our faith. It will run throughout this year.

Spiritual Disciplines – the power of Fasting

Spiritual disciplines are practices designed to help us grow as disciples of Jesus. This month we are looking at the practice of *fasting*.

Fasting can be a neglected discipline, but plays an important part in the Christian life, especially during Lent. Jesus began His earthly ministry by fasting in the wilderness for 40 days and taught His disciples to fast: 'when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, so that it will not be obvious to others that you are fasting, but only to your Father, who is unseen.' (Matthew 6:17,18).

Why Fast?

Firstly, giving up something in my life underlines my desire to put God first in my life. Secondly, fasting shows me how much I depend on things other than God in my life, so I can surrender my idols to Him. Thirdly, fasting encourages me to have a deeper hunger and dependency for God in my life. Therefore, fasting gives me space to focus on God for His strength, provision, and wisdom and leads to a more intimate relationship with Christ. It also enables the Holy Spirit to reveal my true spiritual condition, leading to repentance, and a transformed life and a more attentive heart towards God.

How can I fast?

Usually fasting involves missing one or two meals during the day, although some can't abstain for medical reasons. It might also include abstaining or limiting the time I give to television, alcohol or social media. However, Lent can also be a time to embrace new spiritual disciplines e.g. joining a study group, 'random acts of kindness', or giving more time to prayer and Bible Study. Whatever you do, make Lent count this year!

'Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.' (Matthew 5:6).

All in the month of ... March

It was:

300 years ago, on 8th March 1723 that Sir Christopher Wren, English architect, died. Best known for designing St Paul's Cathedral.

70 years ago, on 19th March 1953 that the Academy Awards ceremony (the Oscars) were televised for the first time.

Also 70 years ago, on 26th March 1953 that Dr Jonas Salk announced that he had completed the first small-scale test of a polio vaccine. Larger tests began in February 1954, and mass vaccinations began in April 1955.

65 years ago, on 2nd March 1958 that the first land crossing of Antarctica was completed by the Commonwealth Trans-Antarctic Expedition, led by Vivian Fuchs. The team of 12 men travelled 2,158 miles from Shackleton Base to Scott Base (via the South Pole) in 99 days, using six vehicles.

60 years ago, on 22nd March 1963 that the British Secretary of State for War, John Profumo, told Parliament that he and Christine Keeler were not in a relationship. A model, Keeler was in sexual relationships with a drug dealer and a Soviet naval attaché. (In June he admitted he had lied, and resigned.)

40 years ago, on 6th March 1983 that Donald Maclean, British-born Soviet spy died. He was a member of the Cambridge Spy Ring.

Also 40 years ago, on 26th March 1983, that Anthony Blunt, British art historian and Soviet spy, died.

25 years ago, on 16th March 1998 that Rwanda began mass trials for the country's 1994 genocide. There were 125,000 suspects for 500,000 murders.

20 years ago, on 12th March 2003 that the World Health Organisation issued a global alert about a severe form of pneumonia (now known as Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome – SARS) that was affecting people in China, Hong Kong and Vietnam.
