A question was asked as to why we do not have fund raising events. The Vicar responded saying that this is due to lack of resources and usually the people who come are mostly people from church who already give to the church.

There were no new elections for the PCC.

Simon Thomas has decided to step down from being a member of the PCC.

Secretary – There were no nominations, so the position is left unfilled.

Jackie Pengelly thanked the Vicar for all the support she gives to the churchwardens which is gratefully received.

SAFEGUARDING

We as a parish are committed to the Safeguarding of children, young people and adults. We follow the House of Bishops guidance and policies. Our Safeguarding Officer is Christine Osbaldiston.

The Parish Safeguarding dashboard has now been set up by the diocese and we as a Parish are now registered to use it.

There have been no safeguarding issues during 2024 of which we are aware.

CHURCH FABRIC AND FURNISHINGS REPORT Jackie Pengelly – Churchwarden

The Boiler has been repaired and serviced with no major repairs.

The Fire Extinguisher's continue to be serviced on a yearly basis and they are checked monthly, to date all is in order.

The organ is in need of repairs but these cannot take place until sufficient funds are in place.

Ken Bennett in the summer kindly sanded and treated the entrance door with Sikkens paint which was recommended by Pott Shrigley Joinery. A letter of thanks was sent to Ken.

Thanks must go to a group of volunteers who clean the church on a monthly basis.

Thanks also to the ladies who provide refreshments on Sunday and Thursday mornings after the services.

The AV system was purchased last year and has been used by the church when required.

We have been very lucky as apart from small repairs the church has remained in a sound and good condition.

Discussion has taken place regarding a new outside noticeboard, this is still ongoing and will hopefully be in place very soon.

FINANCE REPORT

From Richard Raymond, Hon Treasurer

The figure that dominates each year's church accounts is the Diocesan contribution otherwise known as the Parish Share. This is the amount of money that we pay to the Diocese and along with the other 272 parishes this makes up 80% of the Diocesan income. They then budget to spend this money on clergy stipends (salaries), clergy housing and pensions, training, and central support services including help for parishes who cannot afford their Parish Share.

Last year we managed to pay 65% of our Parish Share, £49,000 of the £75,344 that was the total levy.

All our other parish expenditure on utility usage, printing and church admin totalled £20,740 which was £200 less than 2023. There is not much else we can do to lower this figure.

Our total income was slightly higher than 2023 bolstered by the fundraising for the AV equipment. The planned giving and service collections were nearly £3,000 higher than last year which in these difficult financial times was encouraging.

It is worth noting that at the end of the year our bank balance was £23,572 of which over £8,000 was in restricted funds. Whilst the Organ Fund has increased in the expectation of needing to do some work on the instrument, our churchyard fund has now diminished to nothing.

Once again, I record my thanks to Ann Stringer, the wardens, and the Vicar for their support throughout this year, and for the practical help that they give to the financial side of the church's running.

Barry Matthews acted as the Independent Examiner of the accounts, and I thank him for his speedy and comprehensive work. I propose that the APCM appoints him for a further term in 2026.

GENERAL PAROCHIAL REPORTS

ST JOHNS CHURCHYARD

Macclesfield Deanery Synod

2024 Annual Review

There were three meetings of the Macclesfield Deanery Synod in 2024, the first of which was held at Holy Trinity, Hurdsfield on 12 February. The speaker was the Diocesan Strategic Programme Director Jon Pocock. He spoke about the work that was being planned following the Diocesan Vision Plan.

On 7 July we met at in the Church of the Resurrection, Upton Priory where we had a social evening to allow new members of the Synod to mingle and get to know other members. News from around the Deanery included the results of elections to the Diocesan Synod and a number of clergy moves.

The Diocesan 'Treasure the Treasurer' event led by Sharon Taylor-Booth and Bessia Kanengoni came to All Hallows church in Cheadle Deanery on 19 November. It was a joint meeting with our Deanery focussed on parish treasurers but expected to have interest for all Synod members.

During the year we bade farewell to the Rural Dean Revd John Harries as he and his wife Judith retired away from the Deanery. On 19 March Bishop Sam licensed Revd Simon Gowler as the new Rural Dean in a service at Rainow.

In other clergy moves in the Deanery, we welcomed Revd Anna Cerval-Pena as Vicar at Sutton, said farewell to Revd Jonny Frost in July, and welcomed Revd Liz England to the parishes of Bosley, Wincle and Wildboardough in September. In October Revd Canon Vivien Gisby was appointed Assistant Curate to the Macclesfield team parishes and in December Revd Simon Gowler was licensed as Priest-in-Charge at St Paul's.

The Rural Dean and Lay Chair continued to represent the Deanery on the Macclesfield

Archidiaconal Mission and Pastoral Committee and the Diocesan Synod.

VICARS REPORT

Worship in Bollington Parish Church continues to be filled with joy and the presence of God. The Sunday worship is in Spirit and in truth and enabled by our wonderful organists, choir, preachers, welcomers, intercessors, refreshment providers, bible readers and by all the people who attend. It is uplifting. People who come go out with a sense of having gathered in the presence of God who is faithful.

We are a small church with few resources, but a big heart and God is able to do so much more than we can imagine through us and with us. We were blessed in 2024 to have 2 Churchwardens and a Treasurer, with Christine, Jackie and Richard doing so much and with dedicated members of the PCC. Financially, the 2024 reports show that we are not making ends meet and Bollington is not fully funding its own church, depending on support from other communities across Cheshire.

However, it is very exciting, in 2024 it continued to feel like we are pushing at open doors, God is at work here in Bollington pouring out a new confidence, a new sense of purpose and a new joy. The challenge is for us to join in with God, to follow in faithful prayer and in action, opening up to what God is doing, to who God is bringing, and how God is building the kingdom of heaven on earth, here, through us.

Some of the highlights of 2024:

The highlight of 2024 was the ordination as priest in Chester Cathedral of our curate The Rev'd Dr Jenny Eades after which, Rev Jenny has begun to preside at Holy Communion and we have all been helping her new sacramental ministry develop and flourish.

God has been at work in 2024 in deepening and strengthening the worship from school children with lots in church. Highlights include the Easter Experience which saw children from St John's School and Bollington Cross School being immersed in the Easter story together. The Advent Spiral worship saw every child in St John's and Bollington Cross the opportunity to participate and create silent candlelit worship.

Church in the Pub in Bollington, where we meet with local people, some from other churches, discussing Everyday Faith questions and praying together with the community and for the community, continued monthly throughout 2024, with usually someone new participating each month. There are people who come to this who wouldn't normally be in a church service.

Lent bible study, the Pilgrim Course "The Beatitudes" – a good group of up to 13 people, including as many men as women.

Easter was special in 2024. Palm Sunday saw a huge attendance at the All-Age Worship Service which included a donkey for the second year. A Lent Lunch. We held a Holy Week ecumenical workshop. We had a very moving Good Friday service, a well-attended Easter Messy Church for children, a good group of people celebrating the early service on White Nancy, despite the hour changing, and a good attendance for Easter Day Holy Communion.

Through the inspiration of our Licensed Lay Minister, Anne Coomes, we held a collection for Easter Eggs. We raised money to be able to buy real eggs from a farmer in Nairobi to be delivered to feed the children in two orphanages on Easter Day and for Ascension Day.

We held an outdoor Sunday morning joint worship at the mini Bollington Festival involving children.

There is a group of lovely people who give the church a regular monthly clean which makes it sparkle.

We did a big clean up of St John's churchyard, with dozens of bags of waste taken to the tip (remember that?) and the compost bin removed which was full of rubbish.

We held coffee mornings for Christian Aid and Macmillan Nurses and an afternoon tea in the vicarage garden. The church building continued to be well used by singing groups and hosting concerts.

It was an honour to welcome members of the local Ukrainian community along with people from Bollington, civic guests and uniformed organisations to the Civic Service.

We had a continuing of good ecumenical relationships with joint study days with St Gregory's RC and joint Taize worship for peace.

2024 saw us begin to have an open church on a Wednesday with Sacred Space, an afternoon time of meditation and reflection. This has been regularly attended by people who don't come on a Sunday morning.

The Thursday worship continues to bring us during the week with a regular congregation and a very relaxed and accessible Holy Communion.

Pastoral ministry continues with funerals, weddings, baptisms and burials of ashes. Funerals in church have been very well received. We held an All-Soul's service to remember loved ones and we held a service in St John's graveyard.

2024 saw us begin running a bereavement group run in partnership with the Middlewood doctors practice, showing us how much the church building is a healing place of peace and comfort.

Little Owls baby and toddler group continues to be a much-needed place for the little ones and their carers to meet together, particularly for those under pre-school age.

After all the fund raising we are delighted to have a screen in church. We have begun to experiment with ways of using it to enrich our worship.

We had a very high attendance at Christingle held on a Friday and very good numbers coming to church over Advent and Christmas. We sang carols in Mount Hall and in the Cock and Pheasant pub. The new morning time for the Christmas Eve crib service continues to be popular. The Kazoo orchestra on Christmas Day will never be forgotten.
